LIFTT ADOPTS THREE COMMUNITY HEALTH PROJECTS

Healthy by Design (HbyD), ALIVE Project, and (EPHW) Expanding the Public Health Workforce within the Disability Networks.

LIFTT is part of a coalition of nonprofit organizations working on the project entitled Healthy by Design (HbyD). HbyD is a program designed to increase the number of Community Health Workers (CHW) in the community. The increase in workers will consequently improve the health of residents in Yellowstone County.

Through HbyD we will provide health education and advocacy and help consumers to communicate easier with their physicians and other healthcare teams.

HbyD also focuses on education for people to understand healthy choices that will improve their well-being and reduce the cost of health care.

Independent Living Specialist **John Robison** will work as a Community Health Worker for this new program.

HbyD, ALIVE, and EPHW are part of an important opportunity and responsibility for LIFTT. As a consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic, we are becoming a Center for Independent Living and Public Health.

LIFTT TO PARTNER WITH ACTION FOR EASTERN MONTANA TO PROVIDE PCA SERVICES FOR RURAL SENIORS

Glendive - Living Independently for Today and Tomorrow (LIFTT) has reached an agreement with Action for Eastern Montana Area I Agency on Ageing (AEMT) to provide Personal Care Attendant (PCA) services to seniors in AEMT- LIFTT shared service areas, who do not qualify for PCA services under Montana Medicaid.

Residents of twelve counties in eastern Montana aged 60 and older who do not qualify for Montana Medicaid. but may still need help in paying for assistance with bathing, meal preparation, house cleaning and laundry are eligible to apply for this program.

"LIFTT is excited to work with AEMT on this project that will help more seniors in eastern Montana continue to live independently in their homes among family, friends and community instead of being forced into nursing homes and other institutional settings;" said LIFTT Executive Director Carlos Ramalho. Funding for the AEMT-LIFTT Personal Care Attendant program is provided by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

To qualify for this program, the candidate must meet the following conditions:

- (1) be at least 60 years old;
- (2) be a resident and domiciled in one of the following counties: Sheridan, Daniels, Valley, Phillips, Roosevelt, Richland, McCone, Dawson, Prairie, Wibaux, Custer, Fallon, Powder River, Carter, Rosebud, Treasure, Garfield; and,
- (3) not qualify for MEDICAID but still need assistance paying for a personal care assistant (PCA).

The AEMT-LIFTT PCA program will pay for 100% of the services. The program is vital because it addresses the needs and concerns of senior citizens, allowing them to continue to live independently at home and avoid institutionalization. For more information

LIFTT RECEIVES NEW PUBLIC HEALTH GRANT

Expanding the Public Health Workforce within the Disability Network – EPHW

In April 2022, Living Independently for Today and Tomorrow (LIFTT) received a grant from the Administration for Community Living (ACL), called Expanding the Public Health Workforce within the Disability Network (EPHW). The purpose of this grant is to promote and protect the health of people and the communities where they live, learn, work, and play.

The Covid-19 pandemic has revealed just how important Centers for Independent Living and other disability network partners are in achieving this goal. Since March of 2020 LIFTT and other disability network partners have:

- helped people move from high-risk congregate settings to safer settings in the community,
- played a key role in helping people with disabilities get vaccinated including boosters,
- ensured that people with disabilities have access to health care, including COVID-19 treatment, and worked to make sure people with disabilities had the services and supports they need to stay healthy and safe in their community. With this grant, LIFTT will continue to contribute to the effort.

LIFTT recently hired

John Robison and Nancy Grigsby as a Community Health Workers (CHW) for this vital program.





John is a highly decorated, disabled U.S. Army veteran and trained peer support specialist. John will use his own experience to build trusting relationships with the disabled communi-

Project ALIVE Accessible Life-saving Integrated Vaccine Equity

LIFTT is proud to announce that it is working with APRIL - Association of Programs for Rural Independent Living and The Partnership for Inclusive Disaster Strategies on the project called ALIVE - Accessible Life-saving Integrated Vaccine Equity.

APRIL is national grassroots, nonprofit membership organization consisting of over 260 members from centers for independent living, their satellites and branch offices, statewide independent living councils, other organizations and individuals concerned with the independent living issues of people with disabilities living in rural America.

The Partnership is the only U.S. disability-led, 501(c)(3) organization with a focused mission of equity for people with disabilities and people with access and functional needs throughout all planning, programs, services and procedures before, during and after disasters and emergencies. The purpose of the project is to work with the departments of public health and human services of LIFTT's service area and help them identify and remove the barriers that might be preventing people with disabilities from receiving the COVID-19 vaccine.

It is a great opportunity to prepare for future emergencies and pandemics ensuring that the disabled population of our service area will have access to the vaccine.

Project ALIVE is a short-term focused effort to remove barriers to COVID-19 vaccinations for people with disabilities living in rural areas and help those who want a vaccine and need support to access one. There are several types of barriers. Architectural barriers are the most common. They are physical elements of a facility that impede access by people with disabilities to specific locations. These barriers include more than apparent impediments such as steps and curbs that prevent access by people who use wheelchairs.
